### What experience stands out in your mind the most and why?

We were given the opportunity to speak with state Rep. Shannon Bird, and I found her insights set the tone for the biggest lessons I learned about cooperation and government over the course of the trip. At one point in response to a question about ensuring our voices were heard, she said, "Everyone wants to have their voices heard, but you also have to listen." and I wrote that down as a reminder to remember to keep an open mind in a political and cultural climate that seems increasingly driven by shouting matches rather than earnest negotiation.

### What was it like meeting legislative representatives?

The representatives we spoke with were dedicated problem solvers that tied every aspect of their job back to advocating what is best for their constituents, and reaching a compromise with what is best for those in states and

districts across the country. I think it is so valuable for young people to hear about government and politics through the lens of public service rather than as a spectacle of opposing, self-serving extremism.

### What did you learn about electric cooperatives?

The cooperatives making up NRECA invest in their communities not as corporate executives arranging a publicity stunt for profit, but rather as community members themselves that are sincerely seeking the betterment of

their hometowns. In D.C., I was struck by the

parallels between this and the idea of "a government of the people, by the people, and for the people" that has driven our nation's development.

### What was your favorite landmark you visited?

I would say the Library of Congress. We got to tour the Great Hall and see some amazing artifacts including Thomas Jefferson's book collection and a complete original copy of The Gutenberg Bible. The building itself is a stunning tribute to learning in all disciplines, paying homage to great discoveries and cultural advancements through intricately painted walls displaying literary quotes, an incredible dome honoring international contributions, and elegant statues depicting mythological figures.

Save big by combining a PVREA rebate with the State of Colorado e-bike tax credit.

All Colorado residents now qualify for a point-of-sale tax credit discount worth \$450 off a qualifying e-bike purchase from participating retailers.

Residents of Colorado living in Colorado may receive a discount on the purchase of one e-bike once per calendar year.

Not all e-bikes available on the market are eligible for the e-bike tax credit and not all retailers are participating.

PVREA members also qualify for an e-bike rebate through the co-op worth 25% of the cost of purchase up to \$150. Members may submit multiple e-bike rebates


per account per year, up to \$300 in total e-bike rebates.

### **Every College Student Should Know**

Relay these safety tips to your young adults who are about to hit campus for the first time or return for another year.

- Do not overload electrical outlets, power strips, or extension cords.
- 2. Extension cords are only for temporary use. If you must use an extension cord, use it temporarily and unplug it when not in use.
- 3. Unplug small appliances when not in use and all appliances when away for extended periods of time.
- **4.** This tip still holds true: Never walk alone at night.

- 5. Use light bulbs with the correct wattage for lamps. If no indication is on the lamp fixture, then use a bulb with less than or equal to 60 watts.
- **6.** Locate the emergency call buttons or phones across campus in case of emergency.
- 7. Do not put your cell phone on or under your pillow or bedding. It could overheat or catch fire.
- 8. Never tack, nail, or staple an electrical cord to any surface or run cords across traffic paths, under rugs, or furniture.
- **9.** Discard damaged electronics including frayed cords and bent plug-ins.
- 10. Watch out for overheated outlets. If an electrical outlet becomes so hot you cannot leave your hand on it, there is potential for a fire. Unplug everything from the outlet and notify the landlord or dorm officials immediately.

SPARKING BRILLIANCE ONE STEP AT A TIME


We believe it is crucial to invest in our local students and community for a brighter tomorrow for all.

Dedicated to making a difference, your cooperative has awarded over \$500k in assistance to Colorado High School students to continue their education at a higher level. Each year, your cooperative offers 29 scholarships paying up to a combined total of \$53,000 to high school seniors across Northern Colorado.

High School seniors who have been accepted for admission at **ANY** accredited university, college, community college, or vocational school. Applicants **MUST** be dependents of parents, or consumers themselves, who currently receive our electric service.

When we all work together to lower energy use, we can lock in lower electricity rates so everyone saves. Here are a few simple ways to save during peak energy-use times this summer.

- 1. Consider joining Power Peak Rewards to earn bill credits.
- 2. Pre-cool your home before 5pm then raise the thermostat temperature to lower energy consumption during peak times.
- Open windows to trap cold nighttime air and ensure it stays inside during the day with proper sealing, caulking, and insulation.
- **4.** Use ceiling fans to feel cooler remember fans cool people, not places, so only use in occupied rooms.
- **5.** Avoid using major appliances try an air fryer or slow cooker instead of the oven or range.
- **6.** Close drapes and blinds to block heat from the sun.

**Energy Efficiency**Tip of the Month

Placing heat sources, such as lamps, computers, or TVs, near your thermostat can result in false temperature readings, increased energy use, and inconsistent cooling/heating.

Make sure your thermostat is installed in an area clear of obstructions, electronic devices, direct sunlight, and drafts.

Ensuring your thermostat is free from these types of interferences optimizes energy efficiency, improves indoor comfort, and reduces wear and tear on your cooling/heating system.
