


THANK YOU VETERANS

on water heating costs, or you can simply lower the temperature manually.



ach year, Morgan County REA selects a student from our service territory to attend Electric Cooperative Youth Tour in Washington D.C., and another student to attend Cooperative Youth Leadership Camp in Steamboat Springs. These are two phenomenal opportunities for local students to meet new people and enhance their leadership skills, all while learning more about electric cooperatives!

Youth Tour will take place June 16-22. Hundreds of students from across the United States, sponsored by their co-ops, gather in our nation's capital. Throughout the week, students explore historical landmarks like Mount Vernon, Arlington National Cemetery, and many of the memorials and monuments that D.C. is known for. Students also have the opportunity to tour the Capitol and visit with U.S. Senators and Representatives. The tour is intended to help students learn more about our nation's history and how electric cooperatives have played a role. (Taylor Gerkin, acct. ##3700)

Youth Camp will take place July 12-17 near Steamboat Springs. Students from Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas and Oklahoma—also sponsored by their home co-ops—enjoy a week of outdoor fun in the beautiful Rocky Mountains. Activities include rafting the Colorado River, visiting the top of Mt. Werner, swimming, sand volleyball, and more. At camp students learn about electric co-ops by creating their own cooperative, complete with board director elections. The group also takes a tour of the Craig Power Plant and watches a high voltage safety demonstration to better understand how power is delivered to homes and businesses.

"I will always remember the people I met throughout this trip," a camper mentioned. "I have made some great friends and I know those relationships will not stop now that camp is over."





One of the best things about these two phenomenal trips? They are free to attend, with all expenses covered by MCREA.

The deadline to apply for Youth Tour and Youth Camp is Friday, December 20. Applications are open to high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors living within the outer boundaries of MCREA's territory, whose parents or grandparents are MCREA members.

Director elections will take place at the MCREA Annual Meeting on March 18, 2025, at 6 p.m., conducted virtually through a Telephone Town Hall meeting. The directors who are up for election in 2025 are: District 1 – Jim Bostron, District 2 – Kyle Eiring, and District 3 – Larry Hoozee.



STAY SAFE AND WARM: YOUR WINTER HOME READINESS GUIDE

reparing your home for winter involves several key steps to ensure safety, efficiency, and warmth. (Leon McCauley, acct. #xxx5400) Here are top tips to help you prepare before the temperatures drop and a few ways to stay safe if a power outage leaves you snowbound.

Inspect your heating system.

- Have your heating system professionally serviced.
- Replace air filters if needed.
- Ensure vents and radiators are unblocked for efficient heat distribution.
- When using an alternative heat source, follow operating instructions and be sure to ventilate properly.

Prepare pipes and water supply.

- Insulate exposed pipes to prevent freezing.
- Drain and shut off outdoor faucets and irrigation systems.
- Know the location of your water shut-off valve in case of emergencies.

Maintain smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

- Replace batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Test detectors to ensure they are functioning properly.

Prepare your home's exterior.

- Clear gutters and downspouts of leaves and debris to prevent ice dams.
- Trim trees and bushes away from the house to prevent damage from heavy snow.
- Ensure downspouts extend away from your home's foundation.
- Drain and store garden hoses to prevent freezing.
- Service and store outdoor equipment such as lawnmowers and trimmers.
- Gather winter tools such as snow shovels and ice melt.

Increase home energy efficiency.

• Seal gaps and cracks around windows and doors with weatherstripping or caulk. Place a draft block at the bottom of doors.



- Set ceiling fans to rotate clockwise to circulate warm air.
- Lower your thermostat a few degrees to save on heating costs.

Stock emergency supplies.

At home, have enough nonperishable food and water for 72 hours in case of power outages or severe weather. Experts suggest storing one gallon of water per person per day. Include these essentials in your emergency kit:

- First-aid kit
- Flashlights and batteries
- Warm clothing
- Blankets
- Phone chargers and backup charger sources

Gather important documents, medical supplies/medicines and medical records. Don't forget your pets. Make sure you have enough supplies for them as well.

Maintain generators safely.

If you have a generator, store and use it properly. Move fuel-powered generators at least 20 feet away from the home. If it is wet outside, keep it dry by placing it on a tarp. Position it under a portable canopy and never a carport. Never plug a portable generator directly into a wall outlet.
